An Addition to Our Columbarium

Honoring our local Communion of Saints

Located in the Memorial Chapel of the church (to the left of the main altar) is our Columbarium. That strange-sounding word describes any kind of structure, indoors or outside, used as a final resting place for funerary urns holding cremains (the ashes from cremation) of our beloved dead. Columbarium comes from the Latin, *columba* (dove), and originally referred to compartmentalized housing for doves and pigeons, also called dovecotes.

The original Holy Trinity Columbarium was built by parishioner David Starling, who has since moved upstate and no longer does his beautiful woodworking. When we needed an addition, it became difficult to find a cabinet maker who wanted to deal with the company that provides the bronze niches, and that company could not recommend a woodworker.

We eventually found Egan Restorations, and with the coordination of Bob Egan, subcontractors were found who were able to construct an almost-perfect match to our original columbarium. The primary difference is that we chose to keep the coloring of the niches the same color, rather than have variations.

When the Vestry meets in September, we will finalize a new fee schedule for the Columbarium, update our documentation, and make the new spaces available to those who might wish to pre-plan.





The Gospel Matthew 15: 10–28

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Jesus called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile." Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." The Nicene Creed







And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





Music notes...

The Sortie of F Major by Cèsar Franck (1822-1890) is a part of a collection of pieces called L'Organiste which was a commission from the publisher Enoch. The original plan was for Franck to compose 91 pieces, with seven written in each key to make a fairly even distribution between major and minor keys. The pieces are all part of suites tied together by theme and key signatures and individual pieces bear titles such as Offertoire, Communion, Sortie. The suites were designed to be played throughout a service, with the concluding sortie recapping many of the themes found in the suite and sending off the congregation at the conclusion of the service. Franck composed seven suites of the originally proposed 13 suites totaling 91 individual pieces, which cover a wide range of moods and styles; also included are several noéls and folk melodies which would have been widely known to both parishioners and organists. L'Organiste was composed with the harmonium in mind but is equally suited for the pipe organ. ~Adam Koch

CREATION CARE

Honoring our Promise to Protect the Earth!

In our efforts to be friendlier to the Earth, and support a healthier environment, we have stopped ordering plastic cups for Coffee Hour and the Neighborhood Supper. We use paper cups that are good for hot and cold beverages! We use compostable bowls at the Neighborhood Supper on Saturdays, and as needed for other events. We will continue to use the plastic items we have on hand, and when we have no other choice.

Several Options for Compost:

1. Drop off your Compost at Asphalt Green

Sundays 7:30 AM to 12:30 PM, *Items accepted:* fruit & vegetable scraps, non-greasy food scraps (rice, pasta, bread, grains, cereal), coffee grounds & filters, tea bags, egg shells, nuts, cut flowers & houseplants, soiled brown paper products, potting soil. *Not accepted:* meat, fish, bones, dairy, fat, oil, greasy food scraps, animal waste, charcoal, coconuts, plastics, twist ties, rubber bands, receipts, insect-infested plants, vines, excavated soil.

2. Look for the Orange Compost Bins on Corners

Drop-off composting sites across the city can turn your food scraps and plant waste into compost and clean energy while reducing the amount of waste sent to landfills. You'll need to download the NYCgov app in order to open the bins, but once open, you can compost ALL food scraps, plant waste, and food-soiled paper. This includes meat, bones, dairy, prepared foods, and greasy uncoated paper plates and pizza boxes.
