## The Transfiguration

God reaches us even through the clouds.

Every the Church observes the summer, Transfiguration of Our Lord Jesus Christ on August 6, and we're fortunate that this year, it falls on a Sunday. The Gospels of Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:2-8), and Luke (9:28-36) describe how Jesus and his disciples went up a mountain to pray and saw a vision of Jesus talking with Moses and Elijah. A cloud overshadowed them, and even though they couldn't see clearly, they began to hear the voice of God saying, "This is my Son, my chosen. Listen to him." The Transfiguration reminds us of how the presence of Christ can penetrate clouds of uncertainty, fear, or confusion.

Especially this year, as we navigate crazy weather and smoke, strikes in various industries, political turmoil, and all the other uncertainties of our days, we can probably relate to the disciples' sense of confusion, fear, and frustration. We can't see beyond today, but we can give thanks that God still speaks through the clouds, points to Jesus, and says, "This is my chosen one. Listen to him."

And so, that's what we do. We continue to pray. We continue to explore the scriptures and listen for God through music. And we continue to look for the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives and the lives of those around us. Led by Christ's example, we can allow our prayers to be used by God to transfigure us and to fill us with a new sense of God's love and mission. The Reverend John F. Beddingfield, Rector







## The First Lesson from Scripture

Exodus 34:29-35

Lector A reading from the book of Exodus.

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the LORD had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the LORD to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

## The Second Lesson from Scripture

2 Peter 1:13-21

Lector A reading from the Second Book of Peter.

I think it right, as long as I am in this body, to refresh your memory, since I know that my death will come soon, as indeed our Lord Jesus Christ has made clear to me. And I will make every effort so that after my departure you may be able at any time to recall these things. For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as

to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

The Gospel Luke 9:28-36

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah" —not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

#### The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.







And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





#### Music notes...

German composer, teacher, organist and pianist, Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877-1933) is probably best known for his works written for pipe organ, and reed organ. Karg-Elert secured a scholarship at the Conservatorium in Leipzig where he studied composition. Following his time at the Conservatorium, Karg-Elert taught piano, and in 1904 met Carl Simon, a music publisher from Berlin, who introduced him to the harmonium (reed organ). Karg-Elert wrote for the harmonium throughout his life and created one of the most significant and extensive catalogs of original works for the instrument. The voluntaries at the beginning of the service come from his 33 Portraits, opus 101; the 33 works were written for harmonium as stylistic studies. Karg-Elert wrote pieces in the style of Palestrina, Couperin, Handel, Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Berlioz, Chopin, Brahms, Debussy, and others. Today we hear the first two movements of the Cantata di chiesa (Church Cantata) which is a study in Bach, and Lobet den Herrn mit Pauken und Zimbeln Schoen (Praise the Lord with the Drums and Cymbals) which is a study in Handel. Though written for the harmonium, the works translate seamlessly to the pipe organ. ~ Adam Koch

## **Several Options for Compost:**

#### 1. Drop off your Compost at Asphalt Green

Sundays 7:30 AM to 12:30 PM

*Items accepted:* fruit & vegetable scraps, non-greasy food scraps (rice, pasta, bread, grains, cereal), coffee grounds & filters, tea bags, egg shells & nuts, cut flowers & houseplants, soiled brown paper products, potting soil.

*Not accepted*: meat, fish, bones, dairy, fat, oil, greasy food scraps, animal waste, charcoal, coconuts, plastics, twist ties, rubber bands, receipts, insect-infested plants, vines, excavated soil.

#### 2. Look for the Orange Compost Bins on Corners

Drop-off composting sites across the city can turn your food scraps and plant waste into compost and clean energy while reducing the amount of waste sent to landfills. You'll need to download the NYCgov app in order to open the bins, but once open, you can compost ALL food scraps, plant waste, and food-soiled paper. This includes meat, bones, dairy, prepared foods, and greasy uncoated paper plates and pizza boxes.


