### Praying for Jerusalem

Navigating Advent images in prayers & music

A few weeks ago, our Gradual Hymn before the Gospel began with the verse, "Jerusalem, my happy home, when shall I come to thee? When shall my sorrows have an end? Thy joys when shall I see?" I stumbled over the rest of that hymn as I tried to reconcile our idealized version of Jerusalem (which we get from the Revelation of John and two thousand years of theology and religious imagery) with the current reality of Israel, Jerusalem, Palestine, and Gaza.

Adam Koch and I have wrestled with the strangeness of our religious imagery versus the war-torn Holy Land. As we move through Advent, we're going to be reading, praying, and singing, "O come, Immanuel, and ransom captive Israel." We'll probably sing about the Messiah as "Israel's strength and consolation," and we will continue to draw on the deep symbolism of Jerusalem, Israel, Bethlehem, and other terms that will perhaps reverberate in strange, if not painful, ways for us, given contemporary issues.

Especially at this time, I invite you to allow God into this tension around language, imagery, and symbolism. Notice when a word calls you more deeply to prayer or action. Pause when it feels uncomfortable and meditate on the associations that come to mind. And through all our words, may God use this Advent season to prepare us for the King of Love to be born anew within us and throughout our world.







# The First Lesson from Scripture

Isaiah 40:1-11

Lector A reading from The Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins. A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken." A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the LORD blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand for ever. Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

# The Second Lesson from Scripture


2 Peter 3:8-15a

Lector A reading from The Second Letter of Peter.

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

The Gospel Mark 1:1-18

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'" John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ### The Nicene Creed




#### The Celebrant continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





### Notes on today's music...

The prelude this morning and our Sequence Hymn bear the same title, *Nun komm der Heiden Heiland*. This Advent chorale has appeared in hymn books since around 1600. The setting by Bach is from a collection known as the *Leipzig Chorales*, which he revised during the last decade of his life. The melody of the chorale, or hymn, is supported by a walking bass line throughout, a gentle accompaniment in the alto and tenor which is played in the left hand. The ending makes interesting harmonic shifts which may be Bach paying homage to Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

Johann Sebastian Bach's preludes and fugues can be divided into those that were composed while he lived and worked in Arnstadt from 1703 until 1707, Mühlhausen from 1707 until 1708, and those written during his time as court organist in Weimar from 1708 to 1717. The *Prelude and Fugue* in D Major, BWV 532, is most likely to have been composed during Bach's Weimar years, a period when his preludes and fugues reached a level of great sophistication and virtuosity. A prelude and fugue could have been played at the opening of a Lutheran worship service to set the key to which the opening chorale was to be sung. In addition to being played at the beginning of the church service, the preludes and fugues could have served as teaching pieces for advanced pupils or as concert pieces.

The prelude to BWV 532 is a great example of Bach's wide interest in musical styles. The introduction of the prelude begins with florid scales, arpeggiated chords and abrupt rhythms; the middle of the prelude or *alle breve* section is the most developed and is reminiscent of Italian instrumental music which was popular in the Duke of Weimar's Court. The final section of the prelude epitomizes the *stylus fantasticus* (fantastic style) with its surprising harmonies, abrupt rhythms, and a double pedal line. The Prelude in D Major is the culmination of the North German *stylus fantasticus* with the sections being more developed than those of Dieterich Buxtehude (1607–1737), whose musicianship was greatly admired by J.S. Bach.

## A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.



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
