The Third Sunday of Advent Brings Special Joy

One of the great joys of our church is that as the light changes through the day, the stained glass windows seem to come alive. Depending on the sunlight, Lazarus calls for our attention, just over the main altar. At other times, the Virgin Mary seems to be in the spotlight (in the north apse, to the left of the free-standing altar). As the sun shifts, the windows show us Jesus riding into Jerusalem, and eventually picture Jesus crucified on Calvary. But still, the light shines through, reminding us that crucifixion is not the end of the story.

The Third Sunday of Advent is a little like the light we experience through our church windows. This Sunday is called "Gaudete Sunday," taking its name from the first word of the traditional choral introit appointed for this day, *Gaudete in Domino semper*, "Rejoice in the Lord always," echoed in the second lesson from 1 Corinthians. Others call this day Rose Sunday or Refreshment Sunday. But by any name, the day breaks into our season like a burst of light, interrupting our listening, intruding on our waiting, and injecting a new sense of urgency. Something is about to happen, and it is coming from God!

Like the sun that moves around our building to reveal new sights and visions, God's grace moves around us, interrupting our lives with joy, with promise, and with hope. May we perceive the increasing light of Christ this season. *The Rev. John F. Beddingfield, Rector*





The First Lesson from Scripture

Lector A reading from The Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,"" as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. The Nicene Creed







The Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the Blessed Virgin Mary and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



A Tender Shoot



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Notes on today's music...

There is No Rose of Such Virtue is an English text whose authorship is unknown and dates from around 1420. This text emphasizes and celebrates the virtue, beauty, and holy nature of Mary, the mother of Jesus. Symbolic of love and beauty, the author chose the rose as a metaphor of Mary's virtue. The Latin text *Res miranda* translates to "a miraculous thing," emphasizing the uniting of heaven and earth through Jesus' birth. *Pares forma* translates to "all of the same form" referring to the Holy Trinity, the Father, the Son (Jesus), and the Holy Spirit. *Transeamus* translates to "let us go across," which is a call to action urging us to leave behind material and worldly possessions and set out on a journey with the joy and wonder of the nativity as a central focus.

Many composers , including Benjamin Britten, John Joubert, Steven Sametz, and Sting, to name a few, have set this text to music. The setting of *There is No Rose of Such Virtue* that we hear today was composed by Margaret Burk in 2023. Margaret Burk completed a Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Michigan where she conducted the Women's and Men's Glee Clubs and subsequently became the first female to conduct the Men's Glee Club since its founding in 1859. Dr. Burk is currently Assistant Professor of Choral Activities at Carthage College in Kenosha, WI.

Italian composer Carlotta Ferrari holds degrees from the Conservatories of Milano and Firenze. From her website, "Carlotta Ferrari has composed in many genres, developing a personal language that is concerned with the blend of past and present." Her compositions have been performed at Westminster Choir College, New York University, Melbourne Cathedral, Steinway Haus in Hamburg and München, Central Synagogue in New York City, as well as many other notable venues. Many of her organ works have been recorded by Dr. Carson Cooman (composer of the Psalm Chant and several other anthems sung by the choir) and are available on YouTube.

The Advent Wreath. Holy Trinity follows the popular custom of using a wreath with four candles during this season leading to Christmas. The green represents creation and a reminder that even in the dead of winter, new life is taking shape. The candles sometimes represent particular themes or prophets, but primarily, they represent increasing light, as we add a candle each Sunday. The rose-colored candle is lit on the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, when we also especially remember the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of Jesus.

A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.



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
