Praying for Jerusalem

Navigating Advent images in prayers & music

A few weeks ago, our Gradual Hymn before the Gospel began with the verse, "Jerusalem, my happy home, when shall I come to thee? When shall my sorrows have an end? Thy joys when shall I see?" I stumbled over the rest of that hymn as I tried to reconcile our idealized version of Jerusalem (which we get from the Revelation of John and two thousand years of theology and religious imagery) with the current reality of Israel, Jerusalem, Palestine, and Gaza.

Adam Koch and I have wrestled with the strangeness of our religious imagery versus the war-torn Holy Land. As we move through Advent, we're going to be reading, praying, and singing, "O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel." We'll probably sing about the Messiah as "Israel's strength and consolation," and we will continue to draw on the deep symbolism of Jerusalem, Israel, Bethlehem, and other terms that will perhaps reverberate in strange, if not painful, ways for us, given contemporary issues.

Especially at this time, I invite you to allow God into this tension around language, imagery, and symbolism. Notice when a word calls you more deeply to prayer or action. Pause when it feels uncomfortable and meditate on the associations that come to mind. And through all our words, may God use this Advent season to prepare us for the King of Love to be born anew within us and throughout our world.







Lector A reading from The Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. 
1 Corinthians 1:3-9








The Celebrant continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





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Notes on today's music...

Gerre Hancock (1934-2012) served as Organist and Master of Choirs at St. Thomas Church, Fifth Avenue (NYC) from 1971 until 2004. Dr. Hancock also taught at The University of Texas, Austin; The Juilliard School in New York City; The Institute of Sacred Music at Yale University, New Haven, CT; and the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY. Dr. Hancock was presented with the International Performer of the Year award by the New York City Chapter of the American Guild of Organists in 2010. He performed extensively throughout the United States as a soloist, as well as in duo concerts with his wife, Judith Hancock.

The Lord Will Surely Come was written by Gerre Hancock in 1990. The work was commissioned by First Wayne United Church of Fort Way, Indiana in honor of John Loessi's twenty five year involvement in the church music program. The text for this piece was taken from Philippians 2 and The Benedictus Antiphon, which is a part of The Daily Office for Advent IV. The text of the Kyrie is set to the hymn tune Conditor alme siderum, which also serves as the base for our prelude, sung Doxology as the gifts are brought forward, and the postlude.

According to his obituary in *The Times*, Paul Manz, who died in 2009 at the age of 90, "enriched the world of sacred music in a wide variety of ways." One of the many ways Manz enriched the world of sacred music was the composing of the anthem *E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come* in 1953. The text was adapted by him and his wife, Ruth, from The Book of Revelation, Chapter 22, when their then three-year old son was critically ill. It is important to note that their son, John, did make a full recovery from his illness. The melodic theme of the anthem quotes the Lutheran Chorale *Wer nur den lieben Gott läßt walten*. This chorale is included in The Hymnal 1982 on page 635. The opening phrase reads: "If thou but trust in God to guide thee."

The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
