Thanksgiving for All Good

The first chapter of Genesis tells how God created the whole world in 6 “days,” and then rested on the seventh day. After each day of work, God looked at what had been accomplished and “saw that it was good.” Whether one imagines creation in literal, figurative, or poetic ways, the absolute goodness of creation shines through.

As people, and especially as New Yorkers, I think we tend to look at many things and see possibilities. We see what someone can become, we see how someone might grow, or we see a space and imagine how it might be transformed.

But what if we were able to see things just as they are and STILL see them as good? Can we see things, people, and even ourselves as good just the way we are, as good enough? This is not to live as a Pollyanna, to ignore wrongdoing or evil, but it is to be clear-eyed about the good that is in us and throughout the world.

Such an attitude might slow us down. It might help us look more closely. And it might help us accept ourselves, others, and our world with a little more peace.

This Thanksgiving, I’m going to try to see things (and other people) as inherently good in and of themselves—just the way they are, just the way God has made them.





The First Lesson from Scripture

Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

Lector A reading from The Book of the Prophet Zephaniah.

Be silent before the Lord GOD! For the day of the LORD is at hand; the LORD has prepared a sacrifice, he has consecrated his guests. At that time I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and I will punish the people who rest complacently on their dregs, those who say in their hearts, "The LORD will not do good, nor will he do harm." Their wealth shall be plundered, and their houses laid waste. Though they build houses, they shall not inhabit them; though they plant vineyards, they shall not drink wine from them. The great day of the LORD is near, near and hastening fast; the sound of the day of the LORD is bitter, the warrior cries aloud there. That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and anguish, a day of ruin and devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness, a day of trumpet blast and battle cry against the fortified cities and against the lofty battlements. I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the LORD, their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like dung. Neither their silver nor their gold will be able to save them on the day of the LORD's wrath; in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full, a terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth.

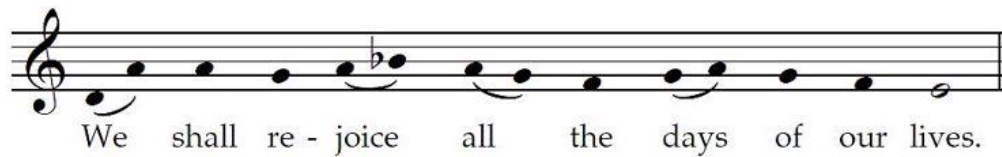

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.



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Notes on Today's Music...

Born in New York City, Randall Thompson (1899–1984) was an eminent twentieth-century American composer, conductor, and educator, known most notably for his choral compositions. Thompson's interest in music began with childhood visits to Maine, where his family kept a reed organ which sparked his interest. In 1916, Thompson enrolled at Harvard University, and auditioned for the chorus. The conductor, Archibald T. Davidson, who subsequently became one of his mentors, turned him down. Upon graduating from Harvard, Randall Thompson became the assistant choral director and professor of music at Wellesley College, in Wellesley, MA, and furthered his education by earning a doctorate degree in music from the Eastman School of Music. Other teaching appointments for Thompson included the Curtis Institute of Music, where he served as director; the University of Virginia; Princeton University; and his alma mater, Harvard University. Randall Thompson's output includes three symphonies, two string quartets, an opera, and numerous choral works which include such staples as *Frostiana*, *Alleluia*, *The Peaceable Kingdom*, and today's offertory anthem, *The Last Words of David*.

The Last Words of David was commissioned in 1949 by the Boston Symphony Orchestra to honor Serge Koussevitzky's twenty-fifth anniversary as its Music Director. The opening statements are full of drama and fire, which is followed by a sense of peace and contentment.

HOW TO JOIN US MORE FULLY

“I’m already an Episcopalian.”

Simply contact our parish office, give Erlinda Brent, the parish secretary, (ebrent@holytrinity-nyc.org) the name of your previous church, and we will do the rest.

“I was baptized, but not in an Episcopal Church.”

Simply obtain a letter from a former church or photocopy of your baptismal certificate. You can also be received or confirmed when the bishop visits Holy Trinity. Contact the rector or church office.

“I’m Roman Catholic.”

First of all, know that you are already welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you would like to unite formally with the parish, simply provide evidence of Christian baptism. Roman Catholics are “received” into our parish. You remain “fully catholic,” but are adopted into the Anglican Communion.

“I’ve never been baptized.”

Then get ready for a life-changing celebration! You will be led through a process that allows you to ask your deepest questions, to search with others for answers and to be baptized at any of our services.

A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhineland, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
