





## The First Lesson from Scripture


Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Lector A reading from The Book of the Prophet Ezekiel.

Thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice. Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep. I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the LORD, have spoken.

Lector A reading from The First Letter to the Ephesians.





The Gospel Matthew 25:31-46

And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

#### The Sermon

## The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.







And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



## Notes on Today's Music...

Carson P. Cooman (b. 1982) began piano lessons at the age of three and by the time he was ten years old began to take organ lessons. Dr. Cooman is a graduate of Harvard University, and Carnegie Mellon University. In addition to composing and concertizing, Dr. Cooman is Composer-in-Residence at Harvard Memorial Church, an inter-denominational church on the campus of Harvard University, and the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston, MA. Since 2015 he has been an editor for Lorenz Publishing Company, and Sacred Music Press. Dr. Cooman has composed hundreds of works in many genres, and according to his website his music "has been performed on all six inhabited continents in venues that range from the stage of Carnegie Hall to the basket of a hot air balloon."

The prelude is Dr. Cooman's Opus 1475, *Ecloque in F* which was written in 2002. An ecloque is defined as a "short poem, especially a pastoral dialogue." The text for the Anthem at the Offertory was written by George Herbert (1593-1633). Herbert was an English poet, orator, and priest of the Church of England. Dr. Cooman composed his setting of Herbert's *King of Glory, King of Peace* in 2013.

Born in England, John Cook (1918-1984) spent the last years of his life in Massachusetts where he was on the faculty of MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology) and was the Organist and Director of Music at the Church of the Advent, also in Boston. Cook's *Fanfare* was inspired by Psalm 81:1-3, found on page 704 of *The Book of Common Prayer*. The verses of the Psalm are as follows:

- 1. Sing with joy to God our strength and raise a loud shout to the God of Jacob.
- 2. Raise a song and sound the timbrel, the merry harp, and the lyre.
- 3. Blow the ram's-horn at the new moon, and at the full moon, the day of our feast.

Here's a reflection by Lydia Colón about stewardship.

Give, Give, Give

"Give abundantly. Feel that you are rich. Have no mean thought in your heart. Of Love, of thought, of all you have, give, give, give. You are followers of the World's Greatest Giver. Give of time, of personal ease and comfort, of rest, of fame, or healing, of power, of sympathy, of all these and many more. Learn this lesson, and you will become a great power to help others and to do mighty things." -From God Calling

In St. Peter's first letter, he reminds us, "As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace." We are called to be stewards of all of God's gifts – our time, our talents, our financial resources, our communities, the earth we live on with its natural resources, and our relationships with family and everyone around us. We must truly recognize that everything belongs to God, and we are caretakers

who are expected to use the gifts in service to one another. Simply put, stewardship is about how we use those gifts.

Stewardship will make a difference. The difference is seen in several areas of our lives. First, the difference is in the motivation of giving. Instead of focusing on the needs of the group to whom we're giving financial support or helping with time and talent, the emphasis is primarily on God and our relationship with Him. Second, the difference is in the inspiration for giving. Stewardship is an integral part of our spiritual life and we give because we are grateful to God for what He has given us. We give freely because we want to, not because we have to. Third, the difference is in the effect of the giving. As we practice stewardship, we find we grow spiritually and that our faith is deepened and nourished. In fact, we find that our lives are changed for the good.

## "I'm already an Episcopalian."

# "I was baptized, but not in an Episcopal Church."

Simply obtain a letter from a former church or photocopy of your baptismal certificate. You can also be received or confirmed when the bishop visits Holy Trinity. Contact the rector or church office.

#### "I'm Roman Catholic."

First of all, know that you are already welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you would like to unite formally with the parish, simply provide evidence of Christian baptism. Roman Catholics are "received" into our parish. You remain "fully catholic," but are adopted into the Anglican Communion.

#### "I've never been baptized."

Then get ready for a life-changing celebration! You will be led through a process that allows you to ask your deepest questions, to search with others for answers and to be baptized at any of our services.

# A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
