Loving our Neighbor

In Luke's Gospel, when a man asks Jesus about eternal life, Jesus responds, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27) After the man then asks, "but who is my neighbor?" Jesus tells the Parable of the Good Samaritan which, among other things, suggests that one's "neighbor" is often very closer than we may notice.

As troubled as we may be about the attacks in Israel, the treatment of Palestinians, and the continuing violence, our own ability to influence the situation is limited. We can pray. We can contact our leaders and we can send money and resources to victims. But we can also practice loving our neighbor close by and pray that God's Spirit will widen circles of love, respect, and tolerance.

This Sunday afternoon at 4:00 PM, we invite our neighbors from St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church to join us for Choral Evensong. Such a service between Anglicans and Roman Catholics would have been impossible for many years, and would still be unlikely in some places today. While our prayer and praise may not establish world peace, we will contribute to peace in OUR world, and that's a start. Please join us, if you can, as we follow Jesus in trying to show love to our neighbor.

Philippians 4:1-9


Lector A reading from The Letter of Paul to the Philippians.

Once more Jesus spoke to the people in parables, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.' But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his servants, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' Those servants went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests. "But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand

and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.








The Celebrant continues



And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



Sunday, October 15th at 4:00PM

October 15 is the Feast Day of St. Teresa of Avila. We will celebrate St. Teresa in this special service with our neighbors from St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, Yorkville.

Music will include Sarah MacDonald's Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, Like as the Hart by Herbert Howells and Abendlied by Josef Rheinberger and Preces and Responses by Richard Ayleward.

Choral Evensong is a sung form of Anglican Evening Prayer that includes scriptures, choral anthems, hymns, and prayers. Fr. Beddingfield will officiate and Fr. Boniface Ramsey, Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, will offer the homily.

The St. Joseph's Choir, under the direction of Mr. Alistair Reid, will join the Holy Trinity Choir, under the direction of Mr. Adam Koch for the service.

Holy Trinity will host a reception following the service in Draesel Hall.

Music notes...

Child prodigy, Amy Marcy Cheney Beach (1867-1944) was an American composer, pianist and educator. She gave her first public concert as a pianist in 1883, the same year her first composition was published. In 1892, Beach's *Mass in E-flat Major* was performed by the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston, MA., founded in 1815. It was the first work the choral group performed by a female composer. The response from music critics was positive, declaring her one of America's foremost composers. Others compared the work to the Masses by Luigi Cherubini and J.S. Bach. Beach's *Gaelic Symphony* premiered in October of 1896, with a performance by the Boston Symphony Orchestra was the first symphony composed and published by a female American composer. Following the performance, composer George Whitefield Chadwick, wrote to Beach to let her know that he and his composer friend, Horatio Parker attended the premier. Chadwick wrote, "I always feel a thrill of pride myself whenever I hear a fine work by any of us, and as such you will have to be counted in, whether you like it or not – as one of the boys." The "boys" were composers who became known as the Second New England School, and included notable American composers George Whitefield Chadwick, Horatio Parker, John Knowles Paine, Arthur Foote, Edward MacDowell, and Amy Beach, who was the youngest, and only female in the group.

Amy Beach's compositions include those for solo piano, songs for voice, chamber music, works for organ, sacred and secular works for choir, and orchestra. During today's service the choir will offer Beach's setting of *Peace I Leave with You*. This smaller work is written for four voices singing in a hymn-like manner. Though the text is from the Gospel of St. John, it compliments the second reading (Philippians 4:1-9) from the lectionary for today's worship service. *Adam Koch*

HOW TO JOIN US MORE FULLY

"I'm already an Episcopalian."

Simply contact our parish office, give Erlinda Brent, the parish secretary, (ebrent@holytrinity-nyc.org) the name of your previous church, and we will do the rest.

"I was baptized, but not in an Episcopal Church."

Simply obtain a letter from a former church or photocopy of your baptismal certificate. You can also be received or confirmed when the bishop visits Holy Trinity. Contact the rector or church office.

"I'm Roman Catholic."

First of all, know that you are already welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you would like to unite formally with the parish, simply provide evidence of Christian baptism. Roman Catholics are "received" into our parish. You remain "fully catholic," but are adopted into the Anglican Communion.

"I've never been baptized."

Then get ready for a life-changing celebration! You will be led through a process that allows you to ask your deepest questions, to search with others for answers and to be baptized at any of our services.

A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
