Lifting High the Cross

How Christ empowers us to move forward

The Church celebrates September 14 as Holy Cross Day, a day for giving thanks for the way in which the cross of Christ gave way to resurrection and new life. The philosopher Simone Weil refers to the cross as a lever, in which "heaven coming down to earth raises earth to heaven." The cross connects and energizes.

Holy Cross Day invites us to "lift high the cross," as the old hymn sings. How, exactly, we lift the cross, can change everything. God is not praised when the cross is lifted high and used as a weapon over others or as a battering ram against those who believe differently. Instead, we're invited to contemplate the cross of Christ as it moves us through the journeys of death into new life.

We encounter the deaths of little things daily or weekly. But we also face the deaths of beloved institutions, customs, and loved ones. Through it all, the cross stands as a reminder of life on the other side, and of love on the other side.

I like that Holy Cross Day comes at the end of summer and the beginning of fall. It reminds me of the direction forward. As we move into new patterns, customs, routines, and experiences, let us allow the power of Christ's Cross to guide us toward new life in hope and in joy.





The First Lesson from Scripture

Realizing that their father was dead, Joseph's brothers said, "What if Joseph still bears a grudge against us and pays us back in full for all the wrong that we did to him?" So they approached Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this instruction before he died, 'Say to Joseph: I beg you, forgive the crime of your brothers and the wrong they did in harming you.' Now therefore please forgive the crime of the servants of the God of your father." Joseph wept when they spoke to him. Then his brothers also wept, fell down before him, and said, "We are here as your slaves." But Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions.


Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God." So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

The Gospel

Matthew 18:21-35

MinisterThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Peter came and said to Jesus, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You

wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

- We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.
- We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

We praise you for your saints who have entered into joy;

May we also come to share in your heavenly kingdom.

The celebrant concludes with a final petition ending with all saying together, Amen.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Music Notes...

Charles Villiers-Stanford's *Jubilate in B-flat* draws its text from Psalm 100, which can be found on page 729 of *The Book of Common Prayer*. In the four verses that make up Psalm 100 the writer sets forth actions. All of the earth is commanded to make a joyful noise, coming into God's presence with a song or cry of joy. The second verse reminds us that the Lord is God and that God made us and that we are all God's, the sheep of his pasture; the end of this verse may be a recollection of Psalm 23 which is on page 612 of *The Book of Common Prayer*. The Psalmist uses the word 'gates' in verse three which may on first look appear exclusionary; the gates are metaphorical extending the invitation to enter and praise God to all in all places and give thanks, and bless God's holy name! Verse four tells us that the Lord is good and his faithfulness will endure; not as action-packed as the previous verses. Instead, the writer ends by telling the reader that the Lord God will endure from age to age - forever. Psalm 100 is one of praise and thanksgiving from beginning to end, encouraging us to sing joyfully when we come together in worship and service.

Composer, organist, and teacher, Maurice Duruflé, is one of the most highly regarded composers of the 20th century. Duruflé published fourteen works throughout his life-time; he was introspective, self-critical, and continuously revising his works, which may have influenced his compositional output. In 1960 Duruflé composed his *Quatre Motets sur de Thèmes Grégoriens* which are based on four antiphons for various days of the liturgical year. Duruflé's setting of *Ubi caritas* is mostly homophonic, with all four voices moving in a similar rhythmic pattern with the melody of the chant always present.

LEARNING AND GROWING

Fall Cursillo Weekend, October 19-22, 2023. Cursillo (pronounced ker-see-yo) is a Spanish term, from *Cursillo de Cristiandad*, which means "short course of Christianity." *Cursillo* originated within the Roman Catholic Church in 1940s Spain, but has spread throughout the world. Begun in the 1970s, the Episcopal Cursillo Ministry has remained in communication with the Catholic Church and other similar ministries, but it functions independently as an Episcopal Ministry and sets its own course.

Cursillo begins with a 3-day weekend, which is a gathering of clergy and laity from the diocese who seek to strengthen their life of faith through worship, prayer, music, study and fellowship. Small "reunion groups" provide support following the weekend. *Cursillo* is an active movement in the Diocese of New York. A number of Holy Trinity parishioners are involved in *Cursillo*.
