The First Lesson from Scripture

Jonah 3:10 - 4:11

Lector A reading from The Book of Jonah.

When God saw what the people of Nineveh did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it. But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. He prayed to the Lord and said, "O Lord! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. And now, O Lord, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." And the Lord said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city. The Lord God appointed a bush, and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort; so Jonah was very happy about the bush. But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. When the sun rose, God prepared a sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. He said, "It is better for me to die than to live." But God said to Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry about the bush?" And he said, "Yes, angry enough to die." Then the Lord said, "You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labor and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also many animals?"





Lector A reading from The Letter of Paul to the Philippians.


To me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again. Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well-- since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

The Gospel Matthew 20:1-16

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

There is grace enough for thousands of new worlds as great as this; there is room for fresh creations in that upper home of bliss.


If our love were but more simple we should take him at his word; and our lives would be all gladness in the joy of Christ our Lord.





And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





Music notes...

George Herbert (1593-1633) wrote the text for the Anthem at Communion, *Love Bade Me Welcome*. Herbert was an English poet, orator, and priest of the Church of England. *Love Bade Me Welcome* is the third in a sequence of poems by Herbert about God's love and was published in the 1633 collection, *The Temple*. The three-stanza poem is a dialogue between a worshiper and love - love being a metaphor for God. This setting was composed by Dr. David Hurd in 1991 to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the ordination of The Rev. Charles W. Scott at All Saints Church, NYC. Dr. Hurd attended the High School of Music, the Juilliard School, Oberlin College, and UNC-Chapel Hill. From 1976 until 2015 he served as Professor of Sacred Music and Director of Chapel Music at General Theological Seminary, from 1998 until 2013 was the Music Director and Organist at Church of the Holy Apostles and currently serves as the Organist and Choirmaster of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin at Time Square. Dr. Hurd is highly regarded for his significant contribution to church music and has composed hymns, choral works, settings of the liturgy, and organ works. Dr. Hurd has a connection to the Church of the Holy Trinity, in that he studied organ with E. Bronson Ragan who served as Organist and Choirmaster of the Church of the Holy Trinity for nearly 25 years. A plaque commemorating Mr. Ragan is on the eastern wall of the organ and choir section of the church.

LEARNING AND GROWING

Fall Cursillo Weekend, October 19-22, 2023. Cursillo (pronounced ker-see-yo) is a Spanish term, from *Cursillo de Cristiandad*, which means "short course of Christianity." *Cursillo* originated within the Roman Catholic Church in 1940s Spain, but has spread throughout the world. Begun in the 1970s, the Episcopal Cursillo Ministry has remained in communication with the Catholic Church and other similar ministries, but it functions independently as an Episcopal Ministry and sets its own course.

Cursillo begins with a 3-day weekend, which is a gathering of clergy and laity from the diocese who seek to strengthen their life of faith through worship, prayer, music, study and fellowship. Small "reunion groups" provide support following the weekend. Cursillo is an active movement in the Diocese of New York. A number of Holy Trinity parishioners are involved in Cursillo.
