A Byrd of Many Sounds

Join us Wednesday, September 6 at 7:00 PM

In my early years of ministry, I had a dim view of the English Renaissance composer William Byrd (c. 1540 – July 4, 1623). My only experience of his music was to hear parts of his *Mass for Four Voices*, when more singers couldn't be found. And when things were really rough, a trio tried his *Mass for Three Voices*. But as in other areas where my dislike was based in ignorance, once I began to learn more, my opinion changed.

Recall that from the time of King Henry VIII's separation from the Roman Catholic Church, England was tossed between Protestant and Catholic extremes until the "settlement" of Elizabeth I began in 1559. During Byrd's time, all were required to attend Anglican church services. Records were kept of attendance, and those absent were reported and called to account as "recusants," that is, scorners of the legal requirement. Having obtained in 1572 a post at the Chapel Royal, Byrd's Catholicism was tolerated, and it seems as though Queen Elizabeth made allowance for his personal devotion.

Part of my affection for Byrd has to do with my own family history, as distant Bedingfields were also Recusant Catholics and supporters of Queen Mary instead of Queen Elizabeth. But more than anything, I admire Byrd's tenacity to follow his religious heart, to serve Christ as he felt he was called, and to share and encourage great beauty along the way.







We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 








The Celebrant continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





Music notes...

Born in Poitiers, France, Louis Vierne was the son of Henri-Alfred Vierne, a teacher and journalist, and Marie-Josephine Gervais. Vierne was born nearly blind due to congenital cataracts. When he was two years old, he heard a pianist play a Schubert lullaby, and after he heard this, he began to pluck the notes of the lullaby on the piano. At age six, he underwent an iridectomy in both eyes enabling him to distinguish shapes and people as well as to read large letters. Vierne first studied piano with Madame Gosset who transcribed music onto larger staves. Vierne was a student at the Paris Conservatoire where he studied organ with Louis Lebel and Adolphe Marty and harmony with Cesar Franck. Following Franck's death in 1890, Charles-Marie-Widor succeeded him at the Conservatoire and Vierne became his teaching assistant in the organ class as well as assistant at the Church of Saint-Sulpice. Vierne was awarded first prize in the organ class of 1894 and remained an assistant to Widor and later Alexandre Guilmant.

On May 21, 1900, Louis Vierne won the competition for the position of titular organist of Notre-Dame de Paris, a position he held until his death. Though this was the most prestigious organ post in France, the Notre-Dame organ was in quite a state of disrepair. Vierne embarked on an American concert tour to raise money for the restoration of the organ. Vierne's concert tour included a performance on the Wanamaker Organ in Philadelphia as well as its sister instrument at the Wanamaker Auditorium in New York City.

Vierne was considered one of the greatest musical improvisers of his generation; his harmonic language was romantically rich, but not overly sentimental or theatrical. Some consider his music to be the most idiomatic for the organ. Vierne's output includes 6 organ symphonies, 24 Fantasy Pieces, 24 Pieces in Free Style, several chamber works, a mass for two organs and choir, vocal and choral music, and a symphony for orchestra.

On June 2, 1937, Vierne gave his 1, 750th organ recital at Notre-Dame and after the main concert the audience felt his performance showed him at his full powers, having played as well as he ever played. The closing section of the concert was to be two improvisations on submitted themes. After reading the first theme in Braille, he selected the stops he wanted to use and suddenly fell forward, off the bench, with his foot hitting the low E pedal. He had a massive stroke which caused him to lose consciousness as the low E echoed throughout Notre-Dame. He fulfilled his often-stated lifelong dream – to die at the console of the great organ of Notre-Dame. Maurice Duruflé was at his side when he died. *Adam Koch*

Editor's Note: The Rector intends to disconnect the low E pedal at Holy Trinity so as to prevent any future dramatic reenactments.
