# **Rekindling our Vision**

Remembering Martin Luther King, Jr.

Though the federal holiday for remembering Martin Luther King, Jr. falls on the third Monday of January, the Episcopal Church also remembers Dr. King on April 4, the day on which he was martyred.

Dr. King lived in constant danger and was jailed 30 times. Through it all, he was sustained by his deep faith. In 1957, he received, late at night, a vicious telephone threat. Alone in his kitchen he wept and prayed. He relates that he heard the Lord speaking to him and saying, "Martin Luther, stand up for righteousness, stand up for justice." He heard God promise never to leave him alone. This vision of God's care and presence was what King would refer to as his own "Mountaintop Experience."

After preaching at Washington Cathedral on March 31, 1968, King went to Memphis in support of sanitation workers in their struggle for better wages. There, he proclaimed that he had been "to the mountain-top" and had seen "the Promised Land," and that he knew that one day he and his people would be "free at last." On April 4, he was killed.

As Christians, whether it is the third Monday in January, April 4, or any other day, we are called to follow Jesus Christ in the way of justice and love for all people.







# The First Lesson from Scripture

1 Samuel 3:1-20

Lector A reading from The First Book of Samuel.

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is

listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever, for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. Therefore I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice or offering forever." Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." Eli said, "What was it that he told you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that he told you." So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then he said, "It is the LORD; let him do what seems good to him." As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. And all Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.

# The Second Lesson from Scripture

1 Corinthians 6:12-20

Lector A reading from The First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. "Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

### The Nicene Creed







By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.




And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,





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### Notes on today's music...

Composer, pianist, organist and music educator, Florence Beatrice Price (Smith) was born in Little Rock, Arkansas and received her earliest training in music from her mother. Price attended the New England Conservatory of Music with a double major in organ and piano teaching and graduated in 1906 with an artist diploma in organ and a teaching certificate. During her time at the conservatory, Price could pass as Mexican, and listed her hometown as Puebla, Mexico to avoid racial discrimination against African Americans. Following college, Price did return to Little Rock, she was unable to secure employment, and following the lynching of a black man, the Price family moved to Chicago where her composing began to flourish. In 1930 Price's Fantasie nègre No. 1 was performed by Margaret Bonds, a black pianist, at the National Association of Negro Musicians convention. In 1932 Price was awarded first prize in the Wanamaker Foundation Awards for her Symphony in E minor and third prize for her Piano Sonata. Florence Price is recognized as the first female African-American symphonic composer, and the first to have a composition performed by a major orchestra. Her musical output is substantial, with over 300 compositions to her name; four concertos, choral anthems, art songs, chamber music, and works for solo instruments, including the organ. In 2009 a collection of her manuscripts and papers was discovered in her abandoned summer home outside of St. Ann, Illinois.

The closing voluntary was composed by Dr. Carl W. Haywood who serves as Director of Choral Activities at Norfolk State University and as conductor for the 105 Voices of History, the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Choir. Dr. Haywood's *Improvisation on* "We Shall Overcome" was premiered in 2011 at the Ministers' Conference of Hampton University in Virginia. The piece is dedicated to "Mark and Virginia Whitmire, and the MLK Service at St. James's Episcopal Church, Richmond, Virginia." *We Shall Overcome* began as a song sung by slaves while working in fields, and later in churches published in 1901 by Charles Albert Tindley, a Methodist minister, with the title *I'll Overcome Someday*. The first political use of *We Shall Overcome* was in 1945 during a strike against the American Tobacco Company in Charleston, S.C. The workers who were earning forty-five cents per hour wanted a raise and as they marched and picketed sang "We will overcome, and we will win our rights someday." The words of this spiritual are often quoted in sermons and speeches delivered by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
