The Day of Pentecost The Spirit as Water

At Pentecost, we often talk about the Holy Spirit as represented by fire—the tongues of fire that appeared over the disciples' heads, the fire of the Spirit that keeps faith alive in us, and the fire that burns away sin to make way for new life. But the Holy Spirit also moves through water.

Ireneaus of Lyons was a 3rd-century bishop who preached about this connection between the Holy Spirit and water. He draws on the wisdom of a baker to point out that dry flour can't become a lump of dough without water. The flour becomes one loaf of bread only through the addition of moisture. In the same way, Ireneaus argues, we do not become one in Jesus Christ our Lord without the water that comes down from heaven. Like dry ground that can't grow a thing unless it receives moisture, like a tree that can't grow fruit until there's an abundant rainfall, the water of baptism and the Holy Spirit make us one in body and one in soul.

We need the "dew of God," Ireneaus says. We need it so that we will not dry up, or be consumed by fire, or lose the ability to bear fruit. God's dew refreshes, enlivens, and restores us.

From the Day of Pentecost, onward, when we eat bread, let's give thanks for the water that went into it, making it whole. And also, let us give thanks for the Holy Water that has washed us and renews us to live with the Spirit of Christ. *The Reverend John F. Beddingfield, Rector*







Almighty God, on this day you opened the way of eternal life to every race and nation by the promised gift of your Holy Spirit: Shed abroad this gift throughout the world by the preaching of the Gospel, that it may reach to the ends of the earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

The First Lesson from Scripture

Lector A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-- in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' "

The Second Lesson from Scripture

Lector A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.


No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses. For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body-- Jews or Greeks, slaves or free-- and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

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Music notes...

One of America's most honored composers, Ned Rorem was awarded a Pulitzer Prize, Fulbright Fellowship, Guggenheim Fellowship, and a Grammy. Rorem's works include compositions for orchestra, piano, various chamber ensembles, solo voice, choir, opera, ballet, theater, organ. He has written 16 books. Though raised a Quaker, Ned Rorem needed sound. In his own words: "Myself, raised in Quaker silence, I craved Catholic sound. Is that why some invisible hand urged me as a child toward the arts?"

Ned Rorem composed the 11- movement suite, *A Quaker Reader*, bringing together his religion and his art; "reconciling the paradox of implicit silence and explicit sound." The fourth piece in the suite is a reflection on the dying words of James Naylor, a charismatic and controversial Quaker preacher in London during the mid-1600's. Naylor preached against slavery and enclosure. His 1656 re-enactment of Christ's entry into Jerusalem led him to imprisonment, having been charged with blasphemy. It was discovered that during the reenactment Naylor's followers referred to him as "Lord" and "Prince of Peace " which may have led some to believe that he was representing the return of Jesus Christ. James Naylor was spared execution, but was sentenced to be put in the pillory and while on there to have a hot iron bored through his tongue, and was also ordered to be branded with the letter "B" for Blasphemer on his forehead, along with other public humiliations. Ultimately, Naylor was imprisoned for two years and sentenced to hard labor. Prison physically ruined Naylor and upon his release, while traveling, he was robbed and left to die in a field. This piece is bestowed as a balm to James Naylor .

There is a spirit, which I feel, that delights to do no evil nor to revenge any wrong, but delights to endure all things, in hope to enjoy its own in the end.

Our Sequence Hymn, *Praise the Spirit of Creation* and our *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God) were composed by New York based organist, composer, choir director, and teacher, Dr. David Hurd. Dr. Hurd attended the High School of Music, the Juilliard School, Oberlin College, and UNC-Chapel Hill. From 1976 until 2015 he served as Professor of Sacred Music and Director of Chapel Music at General Theological Seminary, from 1998 until 2013 he was the Music Director and Organist at Church of the Holy Apostles. Dr. Hurd currently serves as the Organist and Choirmaster of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin at Times Square. Highly regarded for his significant contribution to church music, Dr. Hurd is a composer of hymns, choral works, settings of the liturgy, and solo organ works. Dr. Hurd has a connection to the Church of the Holy Trinity, in that he studied organ with E. Bronson Ragan who served as Organist and Choirmaster of the Church of the Holy Trinity for nearly 25 years. A plaque commemorating Mr. Ragan is on the eastern wall of the organ and choir section of the church.

A Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
