Celebrating with a Franciscan Spirit

This year, we celebrate St. Francis Sunday today and also on Wednesday with a Sung Eucharist at 6:30 PM. St. Francis of Assisi (1181/82—1226) is often associated with gardens and birds. While he composed a *Canticle of the Creatures* and once preached among birds, Francis especially loved and valued HUMANS. He lived a way of peace that stood up to war, a way of humility that shamed the powerful, and a way of love that combined beauty with joy.

Francis had a great love for poverty because he knew that when one is poor, one needs to rely on others, and that reliance can create community. He didn't romanticize poverty, but preached about poverty as the free renunciation of power, control, money, and willpower so that one can be unburdened and more fully available to love.

More than simply having a statue of St. Francis outside, I think we reflect Franciscan values in our common life. Programs of Holy Trinity Neighborhood Center help us to serve the poor and the hungry. Our space is used by Health Advocates for Older People and the Merricats Castle School, inviting a diversity of people through our doors every week. Through worship, program, and mission, we aim to find beauty in things like gardens, windows, art, and music; but also, in the simplicity of lives well lived, of generosity, compassion, and prayer.

The First Lesson from Scripture

Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32

Lector A reading from the Book of Ezekiel

The word of the Lord came to me: What do you mean by repeating this proverb concerning the land of Israel, "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge"? As I live, says the Lord God, this proverb shall no more be used by you in Israel. Know that all lives are mine; the life of the parent as well as the life of the child is mine: it is only the person who sins that shall die.

Yet you say, "The way of the Lord is unfair." Hear now, O house of Israel: Is my way unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair? When the righteous turn away from their righteousness and commit iniquity, they shall die for it; for the iniquity that they have committed they shall die. Again, when the wicked turn away from the wickedness they have committed and do what is lawful and right, they shall save their life. Because they considered and turned away from all

the transgressions that they had committed, they shall surely live; they shall not die. Yet the house of Israel says, "The way of the Lord is unfair." O house of Israel, are my ways unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair?

Therefore I will judge you, O house of Israel, all of you according to your ways, says the Lord God. Repent and turn from all your transgressions; otherwise iniquity will be your ruin. Cast away from you all the transgressions that you have committed against me, and get yourselves a new heart and a new spirit! Why will you die, O house of Israel? For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone, says the Lord God. Turn, then, and live.

Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him.

Fall Cursillo Weekend, October 19-22, 2023.

Cursillo (pronounced ker-see-yo) is a Spanish term, from *Cursillo de Cristiandad*, which means "short course of Christianity." *Cursillo* originated within the Roman Catholic Church in 1940s Spain, but has spread throughout the world. Begun in the 1970s, the Episcopal Cursillo Ministry has remained in communication with the Catholic Church and other similar ministries, but it functions independently as an Episcopal Ministry and sets its own course.

Cursillo begins with a 3-day weekend, which is a gathering of clergy and laity from the diocese who seek to strengthen their life of faith through worship, prayer, music, study and fellowship. Small "reunion groups"

provide support following the weekend. *Cursillo* is an active movement in the Diocese of New York. A number of Holy Trinity parishioners are involved in *Cursillo*. Pray for all those who seek to deepen knowledge of Christ and their faithfulness in the world. 

Brief but Complicated History of The Church of the Holy Trinity



The original Church of the Holy Trinity, founded by the Rev. Stephen H. Tyng, Jr. in 1864, stood at 42nd Street and Madison Avenue. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Watkins, and the Rev. Dr. E. Walpole Warren. In the early 1890s, as Holy Trinity sought to move northward, the possibility developed for Holy Trinity to combine with St. James Church. Serena Rhinelander, who wanted to build a church as a memorial to her father and grandfather, bought out her relatives to amass a parcel of land on East 88th Street, and plans began to take shape for a new mission church. In 1897, St. Christopher's Mission House, the first building of the Holy Trinity complex, was dedicated. The old Holy Trinity building in midtown sold for \$750,000, which allowed \$200,000 to create an endowment for the new Holy Trinity, and the remainder of the money to go to St. James, who could then retire the mortgage on its new church building. When the rector of St. James retired, the former rector of Holy Trinity became rector of St. James, and the Rev. Dr. James B. Chalmers, became the first vicar of Holy Trinity's new incarnation. After Dr. Chalmers, Holy Trinity was led by vicars, the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, 1919-1926; the Rev. Dudley St. Stark, 1926-1932; the Rev. William J. Dietrich, 1932-1940; and the Rev. James A. Paul who began as vicar but was made the first rector with Holy Trinity's independence in 1951.
