Palm Sunday:

The Sunday of the Passion

Holy Week begins today. The Liturgy of the Palms recalls the celebrative atmosphere in Jerusalem as Jesus rode into the city just before the Passover feast. Palms are blessed and the clergy and choir process around the church, remembering the spirit of celebration and expectation that greeted Jesus. The service continues with the Liturgy of the Word and the reading of the Passion according to St. Matthew. Unlike many readings of the Passion (the account of Jesus's mock trial and murder), the words of Jesus are read by the whole congregation. This invites us to identify with Jesus, to remember his humanity, and to imagine what it means for Christians to be "his body" in the world today. After the Passion, the Holy Eucharist continues as usual but especially foreshadows the events of Holy Week.

The color used for Palm Sunday is some shade of red. At Holy Trinity, we use our oxblood vestments and dorsal curtain. The red reminds us of the blood of the martyrs, of all innocent victims, and of the heart of Christ.

Join us this Holy Week, if you can. The various services invite us to move with Jesus through struggle, through the Cross, and into Resurrection.

The Palm Gospel

Matthew 21:1-11

Lector The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

The First Lesson from Scripture

Isaiah 50:4-9a

Lector A Reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah.

The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens--wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord God has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord God helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord God who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

The Gospel Matthew 27:11-54

Lector The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After the announcement of the Gospel, the people may be seated until the reader signals that those who are able may stand.

Lector Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?

Jesus said,

People "You say so."

Lector But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave him no answer, not even to a single

charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed. Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him." Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!" So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." Then the people as a whole answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified. Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him. As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross.

Those who are able are invited to stand.

Lector And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son.'" The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way. From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice,

People "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?"

Lector that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on

a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last.

Those who are able are invited to kneel for silent prayer. All rise as the Celebrant stands.

At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

HOLY WEEK

Monday in Holy Week (8:30 AM Morning Prayer) The Gospel reading at Morning Prayer (John 12:9-19) reflects on the raising of Lazarus as one of the things that leads to the crowds who greet Jesus, when he enters Jerusalem. If

Jesus were to enter our lives in a new way, would we recognize him? How might we greet him? (Online at https://zoom.us/j/8753617165 (for the password, type the numerals for eighteen ninety-nine, two thousand nineteen. No comma or space.)

Tuesday in Holy Week (8:30 AM Morning Prayer) The Gospel reading at Morning Prayer (John 12:20-26) tells us how the disciples Philip and Andrew connected other people to Jesus. How do we do our part in bringing others to the love of Christ? (Online at https://zoom.us/j/8753617165 (for the password, type the numerals for eighteen ninety-nine, two thousand nineteen. No comma or space.)

Wednesday in Holy Week (8:30 AM Morning Prayer, 8:45 AM Holy Eucharist, 7:00 PM Tenebrae Service) We pray our regular Morning Prayer and celebrate the Eucharist early and then at 7:00 PM, we gather for a service special to Holy Week. "Tenebrae" means shadows, or darkness, and it describes the way we gradually extinguish the lights and candles as we read scripture and psalms. The service invites us to experience some of the waiting and praying that Jesus would have done during the hours leading to the Crucifixion. (This service will not be online).

Maundy Thursday (8:30 AM Morning Prayer and 7:00 PM Eucharist) Maundy comes from the Latin word, "mandatum" from which we

get the word, "commandment." Jesus gives the disciples (and us) a new commandment—that we love one another as he has loved, enacted in the washing of feet before the sharing of a meal in the Holy Eucharist. (7:00 PM will be online at at https://facebook.com/holytrinitynyc.)

Good Friday (8:30 AM Morning Prayer, Noon and 7:00 PM). At Noon, we observe the Three Great Hours (the traditional time of Jesus's death on the cross). with the Stations of the Cross with Veneration of the Cross. Rather than physically making our way around the fourteen Stations of the Cross, we will be invited to reflect upon each station and its meaning in our lives. In addition to organ music and hymns, reflections on the Stations will be offered by John Beddingfield, Calvyn du Toit, Doug Ousley, and Pam Tang. At 7:00 PM, we will observe the full Good Friday Liturgy, including scriptures, solemn collects, sermon, veneration of the cross and Communion from the Reserved Sacrament. The choir joins us for the evening service only. (Good Friday at 7:00 PM will be online at at https://facebook.com/holytrinitynyc).

Holy Saturday (Garden Communion Service 7:00 PM) Since Christians retain the Jewish understanding of day and night, Easter begins at sunset on Saturday. Our Easter Eve Garden Communion service observes the lighting of the new Paschal Candle as a symbol of Christ's resurrection and the new life available to each of us. We hear scripture, a short homily, and share the first Easter Communion.

Easter Sunday (Sunrise 6:00 AM at Carl Schurz Park Promenade, 8:00 AM, 11:00 AM and 6:00 PM) The Easter Story includes Mary Magdalene's discovery of the empty tomb and her proclamation the Jesus is risen again. (11:00 AM and 6:00 PM will be online at at https://facebook.com/holytrinitynyc).
