Maundy Thursday

A New Commandment

Maundy Thursday takes its name from the Latin, *mandatum*, and refers to the *mandatum novum*, or "new commandment" Jesus gives in John 13:34, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another." Jesus shows what this love looks like, as he stoops to wash the feet of his friends.

In imitation and practice of Jesus's teaching, all are invited to participate in the washing of feet. If you don't feel comfortable participating in the ritual, simply remain in your seat and pray, sing, or meditate. All who put their trust in Christ are welcome to receive his Body and Blood in Holy Communion. After Communion, the Holy Sacrament is processed to the Altar of Repose in the Memorial Chapel, symbolizing Jesus's vigil of prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane. Finally, the ministers and acolytes strip the chancel of ornamentation, wash the altars, and leave in silence.



The Collect of the Day



Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

The People are invited to be seated for the Lessons.

The First Lesson from Scripture

Exodus 12:1-14

Lector A reading from the Book of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who: eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Lector A reading from the first Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas, son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer

robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."


The Foot-Washing

The Celebrant says

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the life of the Kingdom of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such lowly service. We all need to remember his example. Therefore, I invite you as sisters and brothers who share in the royal priesthood of Christ, to come forward, that we may recall whose servant we are by following the example of our Savior. But let us come remembering his admonition that what will be done for us is also to be done by us to others, for "servants are not greater than the one they serve, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

All are encouraged to participate in the foot-washing: ushers and altar servers will provide directions.






The Great Thanksgiving



The People stand or kneel as the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."



We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary and all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.



And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,







The Stripping of the Altar

The People are invited to kneel, as able.

As the Psalm is recited in unison, the Chancel is stripped of ornamentation. Finally, the altars are washed with water and wine.

Psalm 22

Deus, Deus meus

- 1 My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? *
 and are so far from my cry
 and from the words of my distress?
- O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; * by night as well, but I find no rest.
- 3 Yet you are the Holy One, * enthroned upon the praises of Israel.
- 4 Our forefathers put their trust in you; * they trusted, and you delivered them.
- 5 They cried out to you and were delivered; * they trusted in you and were not put to shame.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm and no man, * scorned by all and despised by the people.
- 7 All who see me laugh me to scorn; *
 they curl their lips and wag their heads, saying,
- 8 "He trusted in the LORD; let him deliver him; * let him rescue him, if he delights in him."
- 9 Yet you are he who took me out of the womb, * and kept me safe upon my mother's breast.

- I have been entrusted to you ever since I was born; * you were my God when I was still in my mother's womb.
- Be not far from me, for trouble is near, * and there is none to help.
- 12 Many young bulls encircle me; * strong bulls of Bashan surround me.
- 13 They open wide their jaws at me, * like a ravening and a roaring lion.
- I am poured out like water; all my bones are out of joint; * my heart within my breast is melting wax.
- My mouth is dried out like a pot-sherd; my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; * and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.
- Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers circle around me; * they pierce my hands and my feet; I can count all my bones.
- They stare and gloat over me; *
 they divide my garments among them; they cast lots for my clothing.
- Be not far away, O LORD; * you are my strength; hasten to help me.
- 19 Save me from the sword, *
 my life from the power of the dog.
- 20 Save me from the lion's mouth, *
 my wretched body from the horns of wild bulls.
- I will declare your Name to my brethren; *
 in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.

- Praise the LORD, you that fear him; * stand in awe of him, O offspring of Israel; all you of Jacob's line, give glory.
- For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither does he hide his face from them; * but when they cry to him he hears them.
- My praise is of him in the great assembly; *

 I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship him.
- The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek the LORD shall praise him: *
 "May your heart live for ever!"
- All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD, * and all the families of the nations bow before him.
- 27 For kingship belongs to the LORD; * he rules over the nations.
- To him alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship; * all who go down to the dust fall before him.
- 29 My soul shall live for him; my descendants shall serve him; * they shall be known as the LORD'S for ever.
- They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn * the saving deeds that he has done.

After the altar is stripped and cleaned, the Ministers depart in silence. Then, all depart in silence. To honor the solemnity of this night, the clergy will not greet worshipers after the conclusion of the service.

Join us as we Journey towards Easter

Good Friday (8:30 AM Morning Prayer, Noon and 7:00 PM). At Noon, we observe the Three Great Hours (the traditional time of Jesus's death on the cross), with the Stations of the Cross with Veneration of the Cross. Rather than physically making our way around the fourteen Stations of the Cross, we will be invited to reflect upon each station and its meaning in our lives. In addition to organ music and hymns, reflections on the Stations will be offered by John Beddingfield, Calvyn du Toit, Doug Ousley, and Pam Tang. At 7:00 PM, we will observe the full Good Friday Liturgy, including scriptures, solemn collects, sermon, veneration of the cross, and Communion from the Reserved Sacrament. The choir joins us for the evening service only. (Good Friday at 7:00 PM will be online at https://facebook.com/holytrinitynyc).

Holy Saturday (Garden Communion Service 7:00 PM) Since Christians retain the Jewish understanding of day and night, Easter begins at sunset on Saturday. Our Easter Eve Garden Communion service observes the lighting of the new Paschal Candle as a symbol of Christ's resurrection and the new life available to each of us. We hear scripture, a short homily, and share the first Easter Communion.

Easter Sunday Sunrise 6:00 AM (at Carl Schurz Park Promenade,) 8:00 AM, 11:00 AM and 6:00 PM. The Easter Story includes Mary Magdalene's discovery of the empty tomb and her proclamation that Jesus is risen again. (11:00 AM and 6:00 PM will be online at https://facebook.com/holytrinitynyc).


