Thinking about the Baptism of Jesus

And reaffirming our own baptismal vows

At Christmas we celebrate the coming of God as Emmanuel, God with us, God in the flesh, God coming into the world as Mary's child, a little baby. Before long we come to understand Jesus as God walking with us, dying for us, rising again for us, God with us, Emmanuel.

Today's Gospel shows us another way in which God is with us and alongside us. It is God being like us, so that we can be more like God. A question arises from all of the Gospel accounts of the baptism of Jesus, the question of why Jesus would be baptized to begin with?

The early church wrestled with this issue. If baptism had to do with the washing away of sins, why did a sinless Jesus undergo baptism? The church wondered in the words of Maximus of Turin, "Why would a holy man desire baptism?" The reason Maximus gives is that "Christ is baptized, not to be made holy by the water, but to make the water holy, and by his cleansing to purify the waters which he touched." (Sermon 100, as reprinted in *The Liturgy of the Hours*, 1975).

This means that Jesus was baptized not so much because of sin, but to bring holiness into the world and to bring us from the death of sin to the life of God's love and forgiveness. With gratitude and joy, we can renew our own baptismal vows.







Father in heaven, who at the baptism of Jesus in the River Jordan proclaimed him your beloved Son and anointed him with the Holy Spirit: Grant that all who are baptized into his Name may keep the covenant they have made, and boldly confess him as Lord and Savior; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting.

The First Lesson from Scripture

Genesis 1:1-5

Lector A reading from the Book of Genesis.

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

The Second Lesson from Scripture

Acts 19:1-7

Lector A reading from The Acts of the Apostles.

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?"

They answered, "Into John's baptism." Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— altogether there were about twelve of them.



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Notes on today's music...

The voluntary at the end of the service, *In dir ist Freude*, is one of the forty-six chorale preludes that make up the *Orgelbüchlein*, or "Little Organ Book." These chorales were composed while Bach was serving as court organist at Weimar from 1708 until 1714. This collection was intended by Bach to contain 145 chorale preludes, or organ works based on melodies sung during a Lutheran worship service. Why Bach did not complete the collection as he envisioned is not known. It is believed that the chorale preludes that make up the *Orgelbüchlein* were written to serve as introductions to hymn singing or perhaps as a setting to be played alternating verses with the congregation. What is known is the deep spiritual message Bach conveyed in writing these pieces. Bach's inscription on the title page reads the following: "... to the honor of the Most High God alone, and for my neighbor, so that he may learn from it."

The text which is sung in worship services to the tune *In dir ist Freude* is set to what was originally a secular dance melody written by Giovanni Giocomo Gastoldi. The combination of a sacred text and this tune first appeared together in a collection of Christmas carols published in 1594 and has since been associated with the New Year. Bach's setting maintains the dance rhythms, punctuated by a carillon-like ostinato played in the pedal. Fragments of the melody appear in the hands between scalar gestures flowing up and down the keyboard. Bach's setting is certainly a jubilant dance into the new year!

Below is the text as it appears in the *Lutheran Book of Worship*, as translated by Catherine Winkworth:

In thee is gladness amid all sadness, Jesus, sunshine of my heart.

By thee are given the gifts of heaven, thou the true redeemer art.

Our souls thou wakest; our bonds thou breakest.

Who trusts thee surely has built securely and stands forever: Alleluia!

Our hearts are pining to see thy shining, dying, or living, to thee are cleaving; naught can us sever: Alleluia!

Jesus is ours! ... We feel no powers, not of earth or sin or death.

He sees and blesses in worst distresses; he can change them with a breath.

Wherefore the story tell of his glory with heart and voices;
all heaven rejoices in him for ever: Alleluia!

We shout for gladness, triumph o'er sadness, love him and praise him and still shall raise him glad hymn forever: Alleluia!
